THE RESULTS IN A NUTSHELL

Western vs non-Western vision of the sustainable city

- There is no single vision of the sustainable city from the global South (just as there is no single vision in the 'West').
- The basic elements of the vision of the sustainable city do not differ between the West and the global South. SDG themes and basic needs are central to both visions.
- Difference in
 - prioritisation of themes in global South
 - Climate & environment = less urgent (but considered fundamental to the realisation of the sustainable city)
 - More focus on themes linked to daily survival, such as health, housing, income
 - Local policies as essential factor in achieving the sustainable city in the global South
 - approach to achieving the sustainable city
 - Culture, local practices & ways of working are not sufficiently considered by (Belgian) development actors
 - Specific agenda e.g. gender, LGBTQ+, democracy and approach is imposed by (Belgian) development actors

Obstacles in the global South to achieving the sustainable city

- Privatisation of social services hinders access to basic social services (education, food security, income, health,...)
- Politics: the impact of political interests, corruption, clientelism and pre- and postelection dynamics on political decisions at all levels of government and on policy implementation
- Lack of citizen participation
- Lack of transparency in local policy development and implementation
- Tension between different levels of government (central and local)
- Absence of a shared vision of the sustainable city between actors in the global South

Shortcomings of international cooperation

- Lack of holistic view of dynamics and relationships between local actors
- Lack of understanding of local cultures and practices
- Imposing its own thematic priorities (e.g. gender, LGBTQ+, democracy) without regard for specific local contexts
- Lack of synergy between projects and actors (both local and higher level)

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR BELGIAN ACTORS OF SUSTAINABLE CITIES PLATFORM

- Greater focus on strengthening **multi-actor participation mechanisms** in policy preparation and implementation.

 This can be done through the support and capacity building of partners in the following areas:
 - Methodology for developing shared perspectives in partner countries in the global South as regards sustainable urban development
 - Methodology (knowledge and tools) for participatory planning processes
 - Specific support for innovative multi-stakeholder participation approaches
 - Methodology for long-term urban planning and spatial organisation
 - Lobbying and advocacy (for policy change at higher political levels)
- Strengthen synergies between programmes and actors
- Sharper focus on (financial, social and technical) **sustainability** of projects of the partner organisation and possibly other local actors
- Better understanding of local realities (local dynamics between actors, culture, etc.) in all project phase
- Revise the approach to themes such as gender, democracy, LGBTQ+ in projects: integrate them more strongly
 within a context-specific approach, improve alignment between international actors' expectations and the local reality on the
 ground

- What is the global South's partners' vision for the sustainable city?
- How can (Belgian) development organisations support partners to realise their vision of the sustainable city?
- · Researchers: South Research
- Commissioned by the <u>Sustainable Cities platform</u>. These are 5 Belgian organisations working on the realisation of the sustainable city worldwide, namely Brulocalis, Echos Communication, Rikolto, UVCW and VVSG.
- Literature review
- Online survey for partners from the Global South
- Interviews with external experts
- 12 online focus group discussions with partners from the Global South
- Online "Sense-making" workshop with partners from the Global South
- Limited number of participants (survey: 103 participants; expert interviews: 3 people; focus groups: 41 participants; sense-making workshop: 17 participants)
- Large participation (majority) of African partners, male participants, public sector participants and those between 30 and 50 years old

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
